

Despite the challenging economic environment caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the OEL has managed to deliver impressive results, demonstrating our resilience and adaptability to market conditions. The OEL and our member affiliates, such as the Electrical Safety Authority, along with our distributors, manufacturers and contractors alike, were all instrumental in bringing change to our industry to bring about better business practices, technological advancements and tools for succession for all to benefit.

Performance within our organization over the last few years has had excellent results. Overall, our total revenue of \$2,909,545 represents an increase of 100% from the previous year. OEL's excess of revenues over expenditures of \$186,855 represents an increase of 211% from the prior year, reflecting the efficiency of our operations. We continue to invest in people and programs, enabling us to provide high-quality services to you while remaining humble and true to our roots. Operations continued to execute

several significant projects during the year. We delivered a range of electrical programs to clients in various sectors, including commercial, industrial, healthcare and education.

Looking ahead to the future, we remain optimistic about the opportunities within the electrical construction industry. We plan to continue to invest in people, technology and training partners to enhance our service delivery to our membership. I will continue to remain on the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors, but, as Past Chair, as there is still more work to do.

This committee meets eight times a year and is informed on critical issues affecting contractors and their businesses.

Members of this committee are able to identify and act on proposed regulations and rule changes.

CONTRACTOR GOVERNMENT **RELATIONS** COMMITTEE

The Ontario Electrical League continues to have frequent interaction with key provincial government ministers and decision-makers to raise awareness of the OEL and to make its issues and opportunities known. At the OEL's 2022 Electrical Industry Conference, Monte McNaughton, the Ontario Minister of Labour, Training and Skills Development, delivered a morning keynote speech and met with conference attendees. Also appearing at the conference was Brad Bradford, Toronto City Councillor for Ward 19 Beaches-East York (and current mayoral candidate), whose ward is home to the OEL's 1920s electric home exhibits on Regal Road and Gerrard Street East. These homes were an integral part of celebrating the 100th anniversary of the OEL.

The June 2022, Ontario election saw the consolidation of Doug Ford's Progressive Conservative majority, during a pro-development campaign that centred on the slogan "Let's Get It Done". The message was embraced by Ontarians who wanted to see more homes and public infrastructure built. The PCs were backed, notably, by Ontario's construction sector and most of Ontario's construction unions, through fundraising and public endorsements. The OEL delivered letters of congratulations to key MPPs and ministers with invitations for continued dialogue in the next legislature.

Minister McNaughton was reinstated as Ontario's Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development (with Immigration added



to his portfolio.) He and his Manager of Issues and Legislative Affairs were invited to the OEL's Etobicoke head office to meet Support Ontario Youth (SOY) participants as part of a Tools in the Trades Boot Camp event. He was joined by his caucus colleagues Charmaine Williams (Associate Minister of Women's Social and Economic Opportunity of Ontario), Stephen Crawford (MPP for Oakville and Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Finance) and David Smith (MPP for Scarborough-Centre and Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development).

In October 2022, the OEL hosted a private fundraiser for Doug Ford in the Premier's riding of Etobicoke-North. In February 2023, OEL members again participated in a fundraising event at the Ontario PC Party's Leaders Dinner. During both of these events, the OEL's presence was highly visible, with the door further open to dialogue on issues of mutual interest.

1:1 APPRENTICESHIP RATIO: FIVE YEARS IN

It has now been five full years since the implementation of a one-to-one apprenticeship ratio in Ontario, with the first full cohort

apprentices of completing its five-year apprenticeships certified and becoming electricians. Since the introduction of the oneto-one apprenticeship ratio, OEL members have been training more apprentices and reporting greater success in hiring young Ontarians. In turn, this enhanced supply and flexibility have fostered the growth and prosperity of member companies.

At the same time, OEL members continue to face significant shortages of skilled and qualified electricians. This speaks to how great the demand is for certified electricians and the need for the province to address the ongoing shortage of qualified workers in our field. OEL expects to continue to work with the government and with Skilled Trades Ontario to seek ways to fill skills shortages.

The OEL encourages its members to build apprenticeships into their businesses. OEL members have demonstrated this leadership in investing in their people as we build a better and safer Ontario.

ENDING WEEKEND AND HOLIDAY CERTIFICATION

The OEL Contractor Committee in its McNaughton interactions with Minister raised the issue of weekend/holiday union certifications and made specific legislative proposals to end this distortive practice. OEL The proposes that the Ontario government make amendments to the 1995 Labour Relations Act to ensure that construction employees employers and are represented when applications for bargaining union certification are adjudicated before the Ontario Labour Relations Board (OLRB). For the purpose of defining the bargaining unit, the OEL proposes that the "date of application test" be replaced by a 7-day time frame up to and including the date of application. The OEL proposes that the response period be extended from two days to five days to ensure that the OLRB has accurate information in making its decisions and to provide procedural fairness to all parties appearing before the OLRB.

These changes would be implemented across Ontario's construction industry, and OEL has the backing of other construction associations to help make these changes happen. A majority of construction industry OLRB certifications are for bargaining units of nine or fewer employees, with the average size of the bargaining unit in these certifications being about four employees. Over 10% of those certifications have occurred on weekends and holidays and it is the OEL's position that this practice must end.

The OEL will continue to press the government on changes that are both fair and long overdue.

EXPANSION OF SUPPORT ONTARIO YOUTH/SKILLS DEVELOPMENT FUND

The OEL remains supportive of the operations and activities of Support Ontario Youth. The organization continues to be very active, is gaining in recognition and is expanding its activities to streamline and simplify the apprenticeship journey.

In its March 2023 budget, the Ontario government announced the expansion of the SDF to include a capital stream to build and renovate skilled trades training centers. The OEL is looking to expand its training capability across Ontario with investments in training facilities in Etobicoke and Ottawa. We are optimistic that up-to-date training facilities will enhance the training experience for OEL trainees greatly, and that the OEL will be viewed as a valued partner in delivering that training.

ADVOCACY AT THE **ELECTRICAL SAFETY AUTHORITY**

The importance of having a strong, competent accountable and transparent Electrical Safety Authority (ESA) continues to be a priority for OEL.

Our members engage with the ESA at multiple levels, including by working with inspectors and sitting on the regulator's Board of Directors. Through its advocacy and recommendations, OEL aims to be a constructive voice in ensuring that adequate measures are in place to ensure the safety of its members and that of Ontarians.

YOUR SUPPORT

The OEL's Government Relations program continues to be directly supported by the donations of members like you. The GR program has many reasons to feel proud of progress made in 2022. OEL members know that government changes can often feel slow to get made. It will take further effort on the relationship and legislative fronts to get results. Members are strongly encouraged to support the OEL's Government Relations fund and its work as we need to keep building on our track record of success. As the Ford government begins a new mandate, we must hold its members accountable to their promises and ensure that Ontario remains a great place to live, work and do business.

This past year, the Electrical Contractor Registration Agency (ECRA) Advisory Council has been busy building templates for licence holders. Some of the updates we'd like to provide include the following:

- Administrative Monetary Penalties (AMPS) is set to roll out on April 1, 2023.
- The Continuing Education Committee (CEC) has now been formed and the Chair of CEC is an OEL member, as well as a member of the Contractor Committee.
- Auditor Generals Recommendation #12 has been rejected by the government and all parties.



We have made significant progress in the past year, but we recognize that there is much more work to be done. As always, we welcome your insight and guidance to help us stay on track and make informed decisions - don't forget that you can submit any licencing questions or concerns through the link found in the OEL's newsletter, Weekly Dialogue. MASTER EXAMINING COMMITTEE

The Master Examining Committee (MEC) is responsible for the content of the Master Electrician (ME) exam as well as the examination process and reports to ECRA. This committee is made up of representatives from the OEL, ECAO and ESA and meets four times a year. The members of the MEC are Doug McGinley, Chair (OEL), Glen Hicks, Vice-Chair (ECAO), Len Oosterhof (OEL), Roy Ellis-Callow (ECAO), Jeff Johnson (ESA) and Ray Yousef (ESA). We work with the ESA Director of Licensing and other ESA staff to run a productive committee.

Roy Ellis-Callow and Jeff Johnson filled seats vacated by outgoing representatives from ECAO and ESA, respectively. Non-voting member Frank Cazzola resigned from his position on the MEC. Frank was a valued member and provided valued information to the MFC.

The MEC held four meetings in 2022. The ME exam is available in three options, in-person written, in-person electronic and virtual proctored. The results of all three are closely monitored, and the results of the three sections comprising the exam have been consistent with each other, as have the final pass rate and score.

With the adoption of OESC 2021 in May 2022, we reviewed questions that are impacted by new code rules to ensure they are relevant. We have been working on updating the information on the website to make sure that candidates for the exam have the information they require to be prepared to take the exam. We have provided input to the



Continuing Education Committee (CEC), and the MEC Chair has a position on the CEC. Now that we have the Competency Profile, we will be working at making sure the ME is aligned with the competencies in the profile.

If anyone has concerns, questions suggestions for the MEC, please contact us through the OEL provincial office.

CONTRACTOR ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Contractor Advisory Council (CoAC) has representatives from both OEL and ECAO as well as one independent electrical contractor. The purpose of CoAC is for electrical contractors to share concerns with ESA, and ESA allowing contractors to help shape future policies.

CoAC had six virtual meetings in 2022, with Ron Bergeron acting as chair for numerous meetings in place of Dave Ackison (who has since resumed his role). Earlier in the year, the discussion administrative around monetary penalties continued as the regulatory development process had begun — and in response to the Auditor General's report, ESA was considering the disclosure of certain information regarding contractors. During the October meeting, it was discussed that ESA is viewing incorporating remote inspections into its systems, and that work was being done to create an online portal app for contractors to upload photos and videos. A survey conducted to nearly 400 contractors showed that 93.5% rated remote inspections as an excellent/good tool.

The council looks forward to another productive year ahead for 2023.

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MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY-TREASURER

In 2022, the OEL celebrated its 100th anniversary — and with the easing of COVID-19 restrictions, the OEL was able to host its first Electrical Industry Conference since 2019. The 2022 Electrical Industry Conference was a success and allowed our members to network with one another, as well as the event sponsors. The OEL's annual audited financial statements were presented at the Annual General Meeting held during the conference, and they showed that fiscal 2022 continued the success achieved last fiscal year.

The Increasing Employer Engagement in Apprentice Training Project once again met its target at fiscal year-end and helped the OEL add 160 new members during the year. The Project and the OEL's day-to-day operations allowed the OEL to double its revenue for the second straight fiscal year. The revenue increase was achieved, all the while the OEL carefully managed its expenses, resulting in the OEL increasing its net assets by \$186,855 overall. The Political Fund (Government Relations Lobby Fund) is shown as a separate



fund in the audited financial statements since the functions of the Political Fund are not directly related to the day-to-day operations carried out in the General Fund. Additionally, during the fiscal year, the net assets of the Ontario Skilled Trades Alliances were removed from the Political Fund. Looking at each fund separately, the net assets of the Political Fund increased by \$2,396 and the net assets of the day-to-day operations in the General Fund increased by \$184,459.

We look forward to a great 2023, and we thank our members and industry partners for allowing us to proudly serve you for over 100 years.
